# Welcome to the Community of Grace Episcopal Church

Every service at Grace offers healing, reconciliation, and joyful worship. The first Sunday of each month, our worship explicitly includes 12-Step recovery prayers and practices. We welcome everyone into Healing, Hope and Recovery, and especially those who are suffering or recovering from grief, addiction, abuse, mental illness, and the hurts and sorrows of daily life. This morning finds us in the 4<sup>th</sup> month of the year, so we turn our attention to **Step 4**:

# Step 4: We make a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.

We gather in Worship to listen to the word of God in song, prayer, 12 Step literature and Holy Scripture. We listen to each other and to a message of comfort, healing, delight, and promise. We experience the presence of God, our higher power.

All are welcome at God's table during Communion where we offer consecrated bread, wine and grape juice.

Please note: Grape juice is served in the ceramic Chalice.

Anonymity is a spiritual principle. What is shared here remains here.

# **Opening Acclamation**

Bishop Alleluia! Christ is risen.

People The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia.

Bishop There is one Body and one Spirit.

O blessed Lord, you ministered to all who came to you: Look with compassion upon all who through addiction have lost their health and freedom. Restore to them the assurance of your unfailing mercy; remove from them the fears that beset them; strengthen them in the work of their recovery; and to those who care for them, give patient understanding and persevering love; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.** 

# We Hear God's Word

Please be seated for the readings.

Bishop

We gather to listen to the Word of God in song, prayer, 12-step literature and Holy Scripture. We listen to each other and to a message of delight, comfort, healing and promise. We listen for the very presence of God, our higher power.

#### **Recovery Literature and Scripture**

Reader: Step 4: We make a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.

"Examine yourselves to see if you are in the faith. Test yourselves. Do you not understand that God is in you?" (2 Corinthians 13:5-7)

"Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me and lead me in the way everlasting." (Psalm 139:23-24)

Self-examination requires rigorous honesty. Redemption begins with an honest account of who we are. We need not be afraid, knowing that God is in us, and God will lead us in the way.

# A reading from the Episcopal Blog 'Through the Red Door'

Step 4 took me by surprise. I was a bewildered addict, but I was willing to follow directions. I was terrified and heart-broken at the thought of actually taking my inventory. I began a list of resentments and fears, and with the help of another person, I learned my own patterns of evasion and blaming. We read in <u>The 12 Steps and 12 Traditions</u> (p. 88):

"The spiritual axiom —every time I am disturbed, no matter what the cause, there is something wrong with me"... Regardless of what is happening around me, I will always have the prerogative, and the responsibility, of choosing what happens within me."

With practice, I became aware of my character defects as they were happening. When I asked for God's help I heard 'pause and listen'. I was surprised to find myself on a path of profound change and deepening spirituality - the kind of spirituality that I thought could never be mine. Before, my Higher Power had been invisible to me; now I am enveloped in God. Join me in the 4<sup>th</sup> Step Prayer:

#### People In the comfort of Your love, we lay before You

the memories that haunt us, the anxieties that perplex us, the despair that frightens us.

Help us discover Your forgiveness and know Your peace.

God, Heal us and fill us with Your light and Your hope. Amen.

#### 1st Lesson: Acts 4:32-35

Reader: A Reading from the Book of Acts:

Now the whole group of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed private ownership of any possessions, but everything they owned was held in common. With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all. There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold. They laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need. *Here ends the reading*.

People: Amen.

# 2<sup>nd</sup> Lesson: 1 John 1:1-2:2

Reader: A reading from the 1st Letter of John:


We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life-- this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us-- we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete.

This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in

darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.

My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; and he is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world.

## A Reading from the Gospel According to John 20:19-31

Bishop The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name. *The Gospel of the Lord*.

People Praise to you, Lord Christ.

Bishop: We invite you to share your thoughts on the Sermon, the Readings, Step 4, or however the Spirit moves you. We also welcome the silences. A chime will mark the end of sharing.

# Presentation and Examination of the Candidates Please stand as you are able.

*The Bishop says:* The Candidates will now be presented.

Priest: I present Todd Stine for Confirmation, and David Lyons and Luke Ciaccio to be

Received into this Communion, and Pam Adamson and David Moyer who desire to

reaffirm their baptismal vows.

Bishop asks the candidates Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil?

Candidates We do.

Bishop Do you renew your commitment to Jesus Christ?

Candidates We do, and with God's grace we will follow him as our Savior and Lord.

The Bishop addresses the congregation, saying:

Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support Todd, David, Luke, Pam and David in their life in Christ?

## *People* We will.

The Bishop then says

Let us join with Todd, David, Luke, Pam and David who are committing themselves to Christ, and renew our own baptismal vows.

## The Baptismal Covenant

Bishop Do you believe in God the Father?

*People* We believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Bishop Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

People We believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord.

He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit

and born of the Virgin Mary.

He suffered under Pontius Pilate,

was crucified, died, and was buried.

He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again.

He ascended into heaven,

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Bishop Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

People We believe in the Holy Spirit,

the holy catholic Church,

the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins,

the resurrection of the body,

and the life everlasting.

Bishop Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread,

and in the prayers?

People We will, with God's help.

Bishop Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin,

repent and return to the Lord?

People We will, with God's help.

Bishop Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

*People* We will, with God's help.

Bishop Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?

*People* We will, with God's help.

Bishop Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity

of every human being?

People We will, with God's help.

The Bishop then says to the congregation:

Let us now pray for Todd, David, Luke, Pam and David who have renewed their commitment to Christ.

A period of silence follows.

# **Prayers of the People** *Intercessor and People pray responsively.*

Reader: Let us pray for healing and redemption, for God is steadfast in love and mercy. Alleluia!

We admit we are powerless over our short comings and addictions and believe only Your Grace can restore us.

People: Healer, hear our prayer.

We decide to turn our will and our lives over to your care.

People: Abba, hear our prayer.

Help us to make searching and fearless moral inventories so we learn to recognize the exact nature of our wrongs. With your Grace, we become entirely ready to have you remove our defects of character.

People: Hear our prayer, Merciful One.

We pray for courage to take stock when we cause harm to others, and courage to make amends.

People: Good Shepherd, hear our prayer.

We ask You to be with us during our daily reflections, so we continue to take personal inventory and when we are wrong, promptly admit it.

People: Redeemer, hear our prayer.

We seek through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with You, precious God of our understanding, praying only for knowledge of Your will and the power to carry that out.

## People: Hear our prayer, Comforter.

Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we carry this message to others and practice these principles in all our affairs. Grant us grace, and opportunity to share the blessings we have received.

## People: Light of the World, hear our prayer.

For whom and what else shall we pray? *People add their petitions*.

*Bishop:* Accept the prayers of your people, O Lord. And look with compassion on us and all who turn to you for help. *Amen.* 

A period of silence follows.

#### Then the Bishop says

Almighty God, we thank you that by the death and resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ you have overcome sin and brought us to yourself, and that by the sealing of your Holy Spirit you have bound us to your service. Renew in these your servants the covenant you have made with them at their Baptism. Send them forth in the power of that Spirit to perform the service you set before them; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.** 

#### For Confirmation

The Bishop lays hands upon Todd says:

Strengthen, O Lord, your servant Todd with your Holy Spirit; empower him for your service; and sustain him all the days of his life. **Amen.** 

# For Reception

David / Luke, we recognize you as members of the one holy catholic and apostolic Church, and we receive you into the fellowship of this Communion. God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, bless, preserve, and keep you. **Amen.** 

#### For Reaffirmation

Pam / David, may the Holy Spirit, who has begun a good work in you, direct and uphold you in the service of Christ and his kingdom. **Amen.** 

# The Bishop concludes with this prayer:

Almighty and everlasting God, let your fatherly hand ever be over these your servants; let your Holy Spirit ever be with them; and so lead them in the knowledge and obedience of your Word, that they may serve you in this life, and dwell with you in the life to come, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

# We Celebrate Holy Communion

Offertory: We Give of Ourselves Please be seated.

Bishop God has entrusted to us all that we have and all that we are. We share from these gifts to support God's work.

Having listened to the Word of God, affirmed our faith, and shared in the peace, we prepare ourselves for Holy Communion. At the offertory, we show our gratitude for the gifts God has given us for sustaining our life, for blessing our church, and for sharing in the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

Donation Plates are passed for those who wish to donate money. You can also contribute by praying for the ministries of Grace Church. The Presider receives the people's offerings and concludes with a prayer of Thanksgiving:

# The Great Thanksgiving Please stand as you are able.

Bishop The Lord be with you.

**People** And also with you. Bishop Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them to the Lord.

Bishop Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.


People It is right to give him thanks and praise.

The Bishop continues: It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

But chiefly are we bound to praise you for the glorious resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord; for he is the true Paschal Lamb, who was sacrificed for us, and has taken away the sin of the world. By his death he has destroyed death, and by his rising to life again he has won for us everlasting life.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who forever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:





The Bishop continues We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

All: We remember his death,
We proclaim his resurrection,
We await his coming in glory;

The Bishop continues: And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine. We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country, where with the ever-blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God, with blessed Joseph, her spouse, and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, now and forever. **Amen.**

Give us today our daily bread.


Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.

now and forever. Amen.


#### We Break and Share the Bread

and grant us strength and courage to love and serve you


with gladness and singleness of heart;

# **Recovery Notes:**

Over 400 years ago, St. Ignatius taught the practice of daily self-examination, which was later adopted by the founders of Alcoholics Anonymous. The instructions below are adapted from https://www.jesuits.org/spirituality/the-ignatian-examen/

**Daily Examen -** The Examen is a technique of prayerful reflection on the events of the day in order to experience God's presence and to discern his direction for us.

- **1. Become aware of God's presence.** Look back on the events of the day in the company of the Holy Spirit. The day may seem confusing to you—a blur, a jumble, a muddle. Ask God to bring clarity and understanding.
- **2. Review the day with gratitude.** Gratitude is the foundation of our relationship with God. Walk through your day in the presence of God and note its joys and delights. Focus on the day's gifts. Look at the work you did, the people you interacted with. What did you receive from these people? What did you give them?

- **3. Pay attention to your emotions.** One of St. Ignatius's great insights was that we detect the presence of the Spirit of God in the movements of our emotions. Reflect on the feelings you experienced during the day. Boredom? Elation? Resentment? Compassion? Anger? Confidence? God will most likely show you some ways that you fell short. Make note of these faults. But look deeply for other implications. Does a feeling of frustration perhaps mean that God wants you to consider a new direction in some area? Are you concerned about a friend? Perhaps you should reach out to her in some way.
- **4. Choose one feature of the day and pray from it.** Ask the Holy Spirit to direct you to something during the day that seems particularly important. What feeling emerges? It may be a significant encounter with another person or a vivid moment of pleasure or peace. Look at it. Pray about it. Allow the prayer to arise spontaneously from your heart.
- **5. Look toward tomorrow.** Ask God to give you light for tomorrow's challenges. Pay attention to the feelings that surface as you survey what's coming up. Are you doubtful? Cheerful? Apprehensive? Full of delighted anticipation? Allow these feelings to turn into prayer. Seek God's guidance.

## Study sheds light on ripple effects of overdose deaths.

From Pro-A (Pennsylvania Recovery Organization Alliance)

When someone overdoses and dies, surviving loved ones can feel as if they've been thrown into a crater of grief. Since 2000, 1.1 million people have fatally overdosed in the United States, and a new study helps quantify the profound depth of suffering. According to a nationally representative survey conducted by the RAND Corporation, 42 percent of U.S. adults said they have **known someone who died from drug overdose.** That amounts to an estimated 125 million Americans.

The study, published in the American Journal of Public Health this week, serves as an urgent call to action for addressing the ripple effects of overdose deaths within communities. Alison Athey, the study's lead author, called for more attention to the reality of overdose bereavement, and said that policymakers and health care providers should do more to reach people struggling with it.
